ENSURING FOOD SAFETY

In developing countries, the mishandling of food causes public health risks. Members of the Greater Mekong Sub-region (GMS) are not exempted from foodborne illnesses and the risks that come with consuming unsafe food.

To help improve the current situation of food safety in the region, New Zealand, through the New Zealand Aid Programme (NZAP), will impart its internationally-recognized food safety expertise to Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar, and Vietnam (CLMV) by partnering with MI to implement the MI Food Safety Project (MI-FSP).


Selected CLMV government officials will be trained on the essentials of foodandsafetyregulatory standards in various value chains, emphasizing the ones related to fresh produce. Through these training programs and support services, CLMV agricultural and food safety government officials will expand their knowledge on how to improve the development and implementation of food safety regulations and standards for selected value chains and market outlets in their respective countries.

The MI-FSP's training approach includes covering food safety topics through models of New Zealand best practices. The pilot training series will also feature targeted CLMV value chains and markets, and a strengthened post-course outreach which will be supported by a new and improved reporting, monitoring, evaluation and framework.

While regional in scope, the project acknowledges the country-specific

needs of each CLMV country. As such, outreach activities will be initiated under the MI-FSP, allowing more freedom for the project to work with each country in a localized manner. The outreach activities extend MI's training programs in a local setting tailor-fit to the needs of each CLMV country.

MI-FSP also establishes MI's food safety credentials within CLMV training and the wider GMS —making the institute a primary provider high-level food safety training of services in the region. This initiative will encourage collaborations other development partners in providing food safety activities in

In four years from 2013 to 2017, MI and the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) havebeen implementing the project on "Regional and Local Economic Development on East-West Economic Corridor" in three provinces including Khammouane, Lao PDR; Quang Tri, Vietnam; and Kayin State, Myanmar.

The project interventions have resulted in significant achievements and contributed to the improved performance and economic situation of smallholder farmers and SMEs.



To assist in improving the enabling environment, the project conducted provincial, national and regional level dissemination and consultation workshops involving the provinces of Khammouane and Nakhon Phanom. These initiatives covered issues on cross-border trade and facilitation and institutional development.

MILESTONES

Efforts on the provincial level include the effective implementation of MI's implementation plan on Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) rice production and promotion, which led to the first GAP Certification for rice in Lao PDR.


Rice mill operators have adopted the Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP) to improve and upgrade their rice producing facilities. These efforts have produced notable improvement on the rice quality and have resulted to the first GMP Certification, the first one in Lao PDR, issued to one of the project's rice mill partners.

MYANMAR

The Project has done valuable interventions for the maize farming in Kayin State, which reinforced farmers to cultivate maize as a winter crop. In 2016, the efforts extended to the Myawaddy District – an area that was difficult to penetrate due to the challenging security situation. To facilitate partnership and cooperation between the stakeholders, the project implemented the tripartite collaboration model.




The tripartite collaboration model pro-motes shared benefits for the farmers, retailers, and the input companies. Following this method, the Project facilitated a cooperation contract between maize farmers and traders.



VIETNAM

The Quang Tri Province is the hub of the Arabica coffee. In order to bring systemic and sustainable changes in the coffee sector in Quang Tri, the project initiated different innovative cooperation models.

The Quadripartite Cooperation Model aims to make quality fertilizer available to farmers on affordable price, by capitalizing on the inter-dependencies between the different actors in the coffee value chain. The value chain actors in this model include farmers groups, a fertilizer company, an agricultural bank, and processing companies.

Supported by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), the project was completed in July 2015. MI's ADC Department continues

to maintain the database, with the following accomplishments:





Projects and partners listed in the database currently total to **560** and **833**, respectively.

Along with regular tweets, monthly alerts to the database subscribers were also sent every third or fourth week of each month to keep interested parties up-to-date with the latest projects, development partners, and stories related to agriculture and food security in the region.



The website got a total of **16,327** page visits from January to December.



114 original feature stories and reposted news articles related to agriculture and food security were likewise published.



The number of Twitter followers grew from **338** a year ago to **1,196** by the end of the year.

The database's Facebook page, which was launched earlier this year, is also currently being maintained.

TOWARDS A MODERN GMS

The GMS moves forward at a fast pace as it adopts a modern transformation.

In 2016, as moved forward to the second year of the cooperation, a pro-entitled Capacity Building on GMS PowerGrid Interconnection has been implemented with productive results.



It followed four components covering professional training for resource persons; developing GMS' power grid operating standard and code; power dispatching, operation and control; and a project synthesis and evaluation.

Throughout the project, the participants have given positive feedback and encouragement to each other. They have built strong connections that promote continuous support signifying a harmonious and great growth within the GMS Power Grid Connection.


PARTNERING FOR MODERNIZATION

MI promotes GMS modernization, innovation and technological connectivity.

To work on these objectives, the Institute partnered with the Department of Science and Technology of Yunnan Province and the Yunnan Academy of Science and Technology Development (YASTD), to implement a three-year cooperative project from 2016 until 2019. This also supports Yunnan to become a new GMS economic cooperation highland and a radiation center catering to South Asia and Southeast Asia.

November 2016, MI and **YASTD** ln co-organized a Training Workshop on Bio Pharm and Health Industrial Innovation and Techno-Transfer in the GMS in Kunming including senior-level government officials, senior managers, and technicians in the biopharm field from the GMS. The ten-year cooperation agreement memorandum was signed and the 'GMS Technological Innova-tion and Technology Transfer Base' and 'GMS Strategy Research

Base' was also awarded.



CERTIFIED LOGISTICS MASTER PROJECT

PHASE II

Funded by the Mekong - Republic of Korea (ROK) Cooperation Fund (MKCF), the second phase of the three-year project on Certified Logistics Master was con-

The Synthesis and Evaluation Workshop for the 2nd modular training was held on February 1-2, 2016 with 29 participants who shared their lessons learned and best practices of their action plan implementation. The workshop evaluated the implementation of the action plan and obtained feedback. The project's Technical Working Group (TWG) revised the curriculum of the Logistics Master Program and assessed the participants to award the "Logistics Master" certification. A total of 26 participants qualified for the Logistics Master certification which was jointly awarded by MI, GMS-FRETA and Khon Kaen University.

The Synthesis and Evaluation Workshop of the third modular training was implemented on October 3-4, 2016. During the workshop, the participants presented the outcomes of the action plans and shared best practices and lessons learned. The participants were assessed on their performance in the modular training cycle to qualify for the "Certified Logistics Master". Out of the 22 participants, 19 participants (86%) qualified for the "Logistics Master" certification.

ducted from October 2015 until September 2016. Under this phase of the project, a series of activities had been conducted consisting of the following events:

The Third Modular Training Program was held on May 23 until June 3, 2016, which was attended by 30 logistics service providers from five Mekong countries. The participants acquired knowledge and skills on different logistics issues including ASEAN and GMS Customs procedure, Cross-Border Transportation Agreement (CBTA), financial management, green logistics, computer-aided supply chain management, and dangerous goods.

GMS Logistics Database: MI is developing a GMS Logistics Database targeting 2,000 logistics companies in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar, Thailand and Vietnam. Aligned with the modular trainings under the "Certified Logistic Master in the GMS," the database is being developed to provide an online information platform to enhance the GMS logistics services network and promote efficient logistics services in the region. The database aims to promote and facilitate business and trade among the logistics companies and members of GMS-FRETA and logistics associations in GMS region. The database is expected to be launched in mid of 2017.



MEKONG - REPUBLIC OF KOREA (ROK) COOPERATION FUND (MKCF) MANAGEMENT

With the launch of the Mekong-ROK partnership in 2011, the MKCF was established in 2013 with an aim promote regional cooperation in the Mekong region through an annual contribution from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Republic of Korea (ROK MOFA). The Fund provides a grant for projects that are of regional in nature and are aligned with the priorities of the Mekona countries to address national issues that facilitate the regional integration process. The priority sectors include (1) Infrastructure, (2) Information Communication Technology (ICT), (3) Green Growth, (4) Water Resource Development, (5) Agriculture and Rural

Development, and (6) Human Resource Development. As endorsed by the Mekong countries and ROK MOFA in 2015, MI acts as the fund manager of the MKCF. At MI, the Trade and Investment Facilitation (TIF) department is tasked with the role of Fund Coordinator to assist and guide the project proponents and implementing agencies through reviewing and shortlisting of project proposals, fund disbursement and monitoring and evaluation of the projects. In 2016, seven projects have been selected for implementation in the Mekong countries.

The Fund provides grants to support catalytic and innovative activities in the six priority sectors:



INFRASTRUCTURE

The aim of the projects is to develop capacities on regional project management related to infrastructure.



In ICT sector, projects related to the use of ICT for regional disaster risk management / climate change adaptation (e.g. early warning system) etc. are envisaged.



For Green Growth sector, projects related to greener growth models, benefiting from both economic and environmental performance are encouraged.



Water Resource Development sector emphasizes on regional water resources management.

Innovative projects to develop regional agricultural value chain are encouraged under Agriculture and Rural Development sector.



Human Resource Development sector is to promote regional cooperation in education and skill development, trade and business.

ENHANCING SME COMPETITIVENESS

ACROSS THE GMS

The volume of trade and investment along the Southern Economic Corridor (SEC) is expected to increase with the formation of ASEAN Economic Community (AEC) and the Dawei Development Project.

The SEC has potentials for further economic development with enhanced trade and investment as one of the most important corridors in the Greater Mekong Sub-region (GMS). However, a recent rapid assessment on SMEs clusters conducted by MI reveals that the agencies and stakeholders involved in promoting SMEs and cross-border trade in this economic corridor still have limited capacities.

The biggest challenge facing the SMEs in the SEC is how to access and create effective



linkages with regional and global markets. Most SMEs are domestic market-oriented and have been facing critical constraints caused by lack of

- (i) capacities and competitiveness at the regional and international level,
- (ii) effective advocacy, and
- (iii) skills of trade negotiation, while a regional approach for SME development along SEC to access regional and global value chain has not been made.

To address the issues, MI formulated "Enhancing Competitiveness of Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (SMEs) in the Southern Economic Corridor (SEC) of ASEAN Mekong Subregion (AMS)" – a project that aims to enhance capacities of the agencies involved in trade and investment activities to facilitate cross-border trade. In addition, it intends to support SMEs by providing a range of capacity building programs.

The Government of Japan, through the ASEAN-Japan Comprehensive Economic Partnership (AJCEP) Component of Japan-ASEAN Integration Fund (JAIF), has collaborated and entrusted MI to implement the Project for a two-year period from 2016 until 2018.

SUSTAINABLE FREIGHT TRANSPORT AND

LOGISTICS IN THE MEKONG REGION

A partnership agreement has been signed with GIZ and EU resulting to a three-year project funded under the EU-Switch-Asia Program of European Commission (EC). The project runs from 2016 until 2018 and it aims to fulfill the agreed tasks allocated to each of the contracting members in accordance with the terms and conditions under the project application approved by the EC. This was awarded in February 2016 and was formally launched in March of the same year. The implementation in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar, Vietnam, and Thailand.

The freight and logistics sector supports economic development in the GMS. Efficiency, environmental performance and safety of dangerous goods transport of the sector become important to ensure countries continue to grow, increase the welfare, maintain their economic competitiveness, and reduce environmental and social impacts.

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Freight sector studies conducted under the ADB's GMS CoreEnvironment Program (GMS CEP), reveal that the movement of freight has increased by 75% between 2002 and 2011, and exports of goods from the GMS almost tripled in the same period. Infrastructure expansion further increases transport traffic activities.

This project builds on and complements ongoing projects under the GMS CEP, which are currently testing green freight interventions, driver behavior improvements, and logistics efficiency solutions. In addition, it will replicate the successful adaptation of the European Agreement concerning the International Carriage of Dangerous Goods (ADR) in Thailand to the other countries.

INTERCONNECTING THE GMS

THROUGH THE LANCANG-MEKONG DEVELOPMENT

The Lancang-Mekong River serves as a crucial route for regional and international transport of goods and people. It hosts a population of 70 million and majority of them rely on agriculture-related livelihoods. The development and enhancement to improve its water navigation is an essential step in the Greater Mekong Sub-region's (GMS) measure geared forward to modernization and growth.

The Government of the People's Republic of China has shown great support in this essential advancement that connects the GMS countries and its members.

MI's initiatives in capacity building to promote exchanges and coordination has paved the way for efforts highlighting synchronized investment facilitation and more importantly, regional cooperation.

This partnership is continuously enhancing means to accomplish the said objective. Hence, capacity building initiatives as well as projects enhancing infrastructure, such as highlighting shipping facilities, will interconnect everyone for a more prosperous GMS.



DEVELOPMENT **PARTNERS**

CHINA SOUTHERN POWER GRID Co., LTD. / YUNNAN POWER GRID Co., LTD (CSG/YNPG) — This is the second year cooperative project between CSG and MI. The project on "GMS Power Grid Interconnection" is being implemented as scheduled. This six-year project is co-funded by the People's Republic of China and CSG.

EU-Switch-Asia Project The three year (2016-2018) project on "Sustainable Freight Transport and Logistics in the Mekong Region" is funded under the EU-Switch-Asia Program of European Commission (EC). A partnership agreement had been signed with GIZ and EU. This aims to fulfill the agreed tasks allocated to contracting of the members accordance with the terms and conditions under the project application approved by the EC. The project was formally launched in March 2016 for the project implementation in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar, Vietnam and Thailand.

HYDRO AND AGRO INFORMATICS INSTITUTE (HAII)

- To enhance Lao government officials' capacities in water resources management for agricultural development, MI and HAII co-organized a TICA sponsored training program on "Water Resources Information System for Agricultural Development" for 14 participants from two Ministries of Lao PDR – Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry, and Ministry of Public Work and Transportation.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT RESEARCH CENTER (IDRC) – MI submitted a project proposal entitled "Promoting Women Entrepreneurship for Export Business" to IDRC. The project is to train the existing and prospective women entrepreneurs to develop and strengthen entrepreneurial qualities and motivation to expand business for regional and global market. It is expected that the modular training workshop will be conducted in March 2017.

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT (ITD) - Founded by ITD, MI organized the training on "Promoting Innovative Entrepreneurship in collaboration with MASHAV. Under the MoU between MI and ITD, ITD agreed to co-fund with TICA for 8 participants from Thailand to participate in a training course on "Sustainable Rural Development".

ISRAEL'S AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION (MASHAV) – MI signed an MoU with MASHAV to strengthen cooperation in agriculture, entrepreneurship, and sustainable development between Israel and GMS countries with the exchange and implementation of capacity development programs. Two Israeli experts served as resource persons for the training "Promoting Innovative Entrepreneurship on December 6-16, 2016.

MEKONG-ROK COOPERATION FUND (MKCF) - Financed through an annual contribution from the Republic of Korea (ROK), MKCF supports the cooperation in six priority areas outlined in the Han River Declaration of 2011 among 5 Mekong countries (Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar, Vietnam and Thailand). MI manages the Fund and also implements a project titled "Certified Logistics Master". The year 2016 is the second phase of the three-year project.

NEW ZEALAND AID PROGRAMME (NZAP) - Funded by NZAP, MI is implementing the 18-month project called MI Food Safety Capability Activity, which aims to assist policy makers in Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Viet Nam (CLMV) responsible for developing and implementing food safety regulations create an enabling food regulatory environment that will facilitate access of agri-food producers and traders to market.

PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA / YUNNAN PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT - The training on "Promoting Cross-Border Trade through Value Chain Promotion" was conducted in November with the funds from the People's Republic of China. The two proposals of "Consultation Workshop on Feasibility of GMS Transport Information Connectivity System" and "Forum on Accelerating Innovation through Energy Technology Cooperation in the GMS were approved by the People's Republic of China, and will be conducted in 2017.

THE GOVERNMENT OF JAPAN - Through the ASEAN-Japan Comprehensive Economic Partnership (AJCEP) Component of Japan-ASEAN Integration Fund (JAIF) supported a two-year project (2016 2018) on "Enhancing Competitiveness of Small and Medium-Sized Enterprises along the Southern Economic Corridor (SEC) of the ASEAN Mekong Sub-region. initiative enhance This aims to the competitiveness of SMEs in conductina cross-border trade and investment, integrating into cross-border industrial clusters, regional and global value chain.

THE PEOPLE'S GOVERNMENT OF YUNNAN funded the planning and execution of a regional modular training program entitled "Poverty Alleviation and Sustainable Rural Development" for 25 government officials and development practitioners from the GMS countries to assist in sustainable development and poverty alleviation interventions for better living conditions in rural communities.

SWISS AGENCY FOR DEVELOPMENT AND COOPERATION (SDC) - SDC has been cooperating with MI in implementing the project on "Regional and Local Economic Development – East West Economic Corridor" for poverty reduction and facilitating an enabling

environment for trade in a regional perspective. The partnerships aims to improve the economic situation of smallholder farmers and small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) and performance of public and private business service providers. It is a three-year project which will end on February 2017. MI and SDC are working on the proposal for the second phase of the project.

THAILAND INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION AGENCY (TICA) - TICA has supported a number of short-term training courses in addition to Thailand's annual contribution to MI. This year MI has implemented 12 courses funded by TICA.






