Proactive Information-Sharing for Stronger SEZ Management

Regional Training Program on Managing Food Safety Along the Food Supply Chain



Mr. Suriyan Vichitlekarn was appointed as MI's seventh Executive Director on September 1, 2020. In his first 44 days in office, Khun Suriyan has been finalizing the Strategic Plan, overseeing operations, completing long rounds of meetings with dignitaries, and promoting MI services to prospective international partners, while still finding quality time to get to know each of the 45-member MI staff.

In this interview, read about the man who has been an inspiring force to the MI family.

Can you tell us something about yourself?

I am an ordinary man with simple tastes, who loves playing the guitar, traveling, and running. I am also an advocate of agriculture as the primary benchmark of real progress in any society and country. This is why my career has been dedicated to helping advance agricultural development and improve farmers' livelihoods in Southeast Asia, including the Mekong region.

And like our MI colleagues, I am a lifelong champion of regional cooperation for the core principle it espouses—that we are stronger in delivering purposeful work together, rather than apart.





What do you think makes MI unique and different from other organizations in the region?

Institutionally, MI stands out for its country membership and ownership. To represent and be represented by the governments of Cambodia, P.R. China, Lao PDR, Myanmar, Thailand, and Vietnam is a privilege not granted to many.

Moreover, our work is special because we get to operationalize cooperation in the everyday lives of many. Be it in facilitating trainings that allow participants to find solutions to common challenges; conducting studies that result to policies which protect people's welfare, or convening high-level discussions with prime movers to help small- and medium-sized enterprise survive, our work—when combined—transforms lives.

What are your priorities for MI?

For this to happen, we must invest in our **efficiency** by strengthening internal systems and processes and being **effective** in taking more measured and results-based approaches to deliver **sustainable** development in the region.

I see MI continuing to bridge regional cooperation and integration through higher levels of technical services. Building on the gains of the last decades, MI will be coalescing its expertise to produce holistic development well beyond the boundary of single impact projects.

I also foresee MI expanding its network to more dynamic and multi-level linkages of people who—while representing government, the private sector, international organizations, businesses, and many other types of groups—will be proudly described as an MI alumna or partner.

What is your message to the MI family?

That I stand equal to each of you in value and work. It is my sincere hope that we work in synergy so we, as MI, can be a catalyst for positive change.
